MASONIC ORDER FOUNDED IN 1850, HAS GROWN CONSISTENTLY

Own Their Own Buildings Which House Lodge Rooms

(Oct. 5, 1960)

This is a short history of the Mount Pulaski Lodge No. 87 A. F. & A. M., since the issuance of its charter in 1850, just 14 years after the founding of the city. Record has it that it was issued October 8 of that year, to David P. Bunn, Master; J. R. Braucher, Senior Warden; R. Carlyle, Junior Warden; and other members whose names could not be obtained.

Mount Pulaski Lodge #87 A.F. & A.M., received a Special Dispensation in February, 1850, to operate until their Charter was issued on October 8th, 1850 at the Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge of Illinois at Shawneetown.

For the year 1851 the following were officers: David P. Bunn, Master; J. R. Braucher, Senior Warden; R. Carlisle, Junior Warden; A. Edmunds, Treasurer; John T. Jenkins, Secretary; W. B. Harry, Senior Deacon; Luther Hill, Junior Deacon; W. C. Snyder, Tyler.

The following were members at that time: T. Leads, R. O. Paranteau, G. W. Finley, W. H. Young, Granville Fain, DeGrasse Brooks, Robert Grun, S. Kahn, James McGraw, M. Kahn, R. B. Latham, J. B. McIntosh, John Clark, Charles Capps, Henry Vonderlieth, H. B. Rowe, Jesse Blackledge and others for a total of 25 members.

At the time the charter was issued to the lodge, the meetings were held on the east side of the public square in the building formerly occupied by the Snyder carpenter shop, now the George Wolcott Gas and Appliance Co.

Later the meeting place was changed to the second floor of the two-story brick building formerly owned and occupied by the store of the C. F. Schafer Co. After several years there the lodge bought the building they now occupy, and at the present time is owned jointly by Mount Pulaski Lodge No. 87, A.F. & A.M., Mount Pulaski Chapter No. 121, Royal Arch Masons and Mount Pulaski Commandery No. 39 Knights Templar. The Order of Eastern Star uses it for their meeting place.

There have been 449 members join this lodge during the century, but the hand of death has taken many, and with transfers to others Lodges, leaves the 1950 membership at 169.
