Founded as a social order on Nov. 28, 1888, in Council Bluffs, Iowa, Royal Neighbors of America was chartered as a fraternal benefit society on March 21, 1895. The first subordinate camp, designated as No. 1 was instituted in Council Bluffs on July 3, 1890, and is still in existence.

Establishment of a juvenile department was on March 21, 1918. True fraternalism, exemplified by aid and other activities, is one of the underlying principles of Royal Neighbors of America. In 66 years the Society and its camps have expended several million dollars in fraternal aid. The Fraternal Fund, the Royal Neighbor Home, the camps, the free health service and the Royal Neighbor Home Endowment are the fraternal aid agencies of the Society. These are of benefit to thousands of members annually.

The Royal Neighbor Home, located on a 41-acre site near Davenport, Iowa, is utilized for the care of aged and dependent Royal Neighbors, while direct aid consists of assistance to members in times of accident, adversity, disaster and illness.

The free health service was established in 1927 to enlarge the benefits of Royal Neighbors of America.
