Mrs. Ora Ayers Died Friday

Mrs. Ora Z. Ayers, widow of Charles Ayers, died at 11:50 p. m., Friday, Dec. 4, 1942, at the Peoria state hospital, where she had been a patient for several years. She was aged 69 years, 11 months and 24 days.

Ora Z. Payne was born in the southeast part of Mount Pulaski township on Dec. 10, 1872, a daughter of Willis F. and Lydia Copeland Payne, well known early day residents of this community. On Oct. 8, 1895, she married Charles Ayers, and they lived on the old Payne farm for many years, moving into the city the latter part of the 1920's, where her husband passed away March 30, 1930. Two sons, Geo. and Richard, also preceded her in death. She was a member of the Copeland Christian church.

Mrs. Ayers is survived by one son, Willis Ayers, living on the home farm; two grandsons and four granddaughters; two sisters, Mrs. Ernest Payne, Mount Pulaski and Mrs. Correl Bailes, of Springfield.

The body was removed to the Schahl funeral home, remaining there until the hour of the funeral.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. Monday, Dec. 7, 1942, at the Copeland Christian church, six miles southwest of Mount Pulaski, conducted by Rev. L. H. Hooe of Illiopolis. Three hymns, "No Night There," "Safe In the Arms of Jesus," and "Sometime We'll Understand," were sung by a mixed quartet composed of Mrs. Ellis Quandt, Miss Maude Herring, Clarence and George Bowers, with Miss Joyce Bowers as organ accompanist.
