

**AN ORDINANCE**

Granting the Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mt. Pulaski, Illinois, its Successors and Assigns the right to erect and maintain a system of telephones in the City of Mt. Pulaski, Illinois.

**Section 1.**

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Mt. Pulaski: that the Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mt. Pulaski, Illinois, its successors or assigns are hereby granted for a period of Fifteen years from the passage and publication of this Ordinance, the right to place and maintain upon and under the streets and alleys and public grounds of said city, poles, conduit, underground construction, cables, wires and fixtures necessary and convenient for supplying the citizens of said city and the public with communication by telephone or other improved electrical device or means of communication.

**Section 2.**

Any and all conduits and underground construction and all poles, wires, cables and fixtures hereinafter erected, constructed, strung or placed in said city under this ordinance shall be so erected, constructed, strung or placed to conform to the provisions of the general Ordinances of said city regulating telegraph, telephone and other poles and wires except in those particulars wherein such general ordinances are changed or modified by the provisions hereof.

**Section 3.**

Said the Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mt. Pulaski, Illinois, its successors or assigns may place on the poles erected on Cook Street between the West side of Washington St., and the East side of Lafayette St., in said city such wires as may be required by said Company, its Successors or Assigns, for the use of their toll and country lines outside of the cable required to be used on said Street; also said Company its Successors or Assigns, may place the wires for toll and country lines outside of cables required to be used on Jefferson Street, between the West side of Washington street and the East side of Lafayette street. The wires not in cables on above specified portion of said streets to be strung on cross arms above cable.

**Section 4.**

The said, the Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mount Pulaski, Illinois, its successors or assigns, shall fully indemnify the said city and save and keep it harmless from and on account of every and all demands,

claims, cause of action, and from all arising from its or their use or misuse of the rights herein granted.

**Section 5.**

The acceptance of this ordinance shall be taken to and shall be a release of all rights that the said company or any of its predecessors has in and to any previous ordinances relating to the erection and maintenance of a system of telephones heretofore granted placed by said City Council of Mount Pulaski, Illinois. And all ordinances heretofore passed by said City Council granting rights or privileges to the said Company or anyone from which it has obtained assignments of rights and privileges to build or construct a system of telephone lines are hereby repealed.

**Section 6.**

Permission is given the City of Mount Pulaski by the said, The Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company, its successors and assigns, the right to place and maintain upon the poles of said company, two (2) insulated copper wires for the use of the fire alarm system of said city.

**Section 7.**

The said City of Mount Pulaski expressly reserves the right to grant the right of way through and upon the streets, alleys and public grounds of said city to any other telephone company, or to any individual or individuals for a system of telegraph, telephone or other electric lines, with the right to erect the necessary poles, wires and material to construct the same.

**Section 8.**

The said, The Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mount Pulaski, Illinois, shall at its cost and expense, cause legal publication to be made of this ordinance and shall file with the City Clerk a publisher's certificate showing such publication to have been made. And this ordinance shall take effect and be in force when there shall be filed in the office of the city clerk the certificate of said publishers showing legal publication to have been made and also a written acceptance of said ordinance by the said, The Mt. Pulaski Telephone and Electric Company of Mount Pulaski, Illinois, its successors or assigns.
