He returned to Lincoln in 1897, formed a law partnership with W. R. Baldwin, now deceased, nd in 1899 as elected State Senator. He was his party's nominee for President of the State Senate and minority leader of that body.

In 1899 he was selected attorney of the Building Committee of the Board of Supervisors in the matter of the erection and furnishing of the present Court House of the county, and, at his uggestion, no bonds for such erection were issued but provision was made for the payment of the cost by direct taxation in three annual installments.

Waiver of objections to such taxation was secured by him from the railroads, no other objections were filed and when the county officers moved into the new building, the entire cost of the erection of the building was paid for, a record unsurpassed in court house construction, before or since, in the state's history.

In 1903, he was nominated by his party for Governor of Illinois, his successful opponent being his personal friend, Charles S. Deneen. The campaign was signally devoid of personalities, nd Governor Deneen, soon after his election, did the unusual thing of appointing Judge Stringer as Judge of the State Court of Claims, which position Judge Stringer held during the entire Deneen administration.




