

GAS RATIONING

3. You cannot register if you have more than five tires for your car in your possession. You must dispose even of the old ones that are worn out.

4. Passenger automobile owners get Ration Book A and motorcycle owners Ration Book D. Motor driven 'scooters' are included under motorcycles.

5. Each application must be signed by the person in whose name the car is registered for its state license.

Other Gas Users

Users of gasoline for non-highway transportation as well as kerosene users may secure application blanks from service stations and after properly filling them out, mail to the Logan County War Price and Rationing

Board at Lincoln in order to secure gas for their needs.

Application for additional gas must be filled out and mailed to the County Board at Lincoln.

In order that everyone will know about air mail postage, Postmaster Charles Anderson furnishes the following information:

Air mail addressed to a member of the armed forces, in care of the postmaster at New York, San Francisco, New Orleans, Miami, and Presque Isle, Maine, should be prepaid at the rate of 6 cents a half ounce. Air mail addressed to Seattle, Wash., should be prepaid at rate of 6 cents an ounce.
