3. You cannot register if you have more than five tires for your car in your possession. You must dispose even of the old ones that are worn out.

4. Passenger automobile own ers get Ration Book A and motorcycle owners Ration Book D. Motor driven 'scooters' are included under motorcycles.

5. Each application must be signed by the person in whose name the car is registered for its' state license.
