## First Quarter

Ayers, playing his first season as a regular, had the honor of scoring the first basket, taking a rebound soon after the tipoff to score. Buckles fouled on a shot, sank one free throw. West, another new regular, drove in thru center to score. Buckles took a short pass from Bertoni to score back over his head. West scooped up a loose ball and close under scored again. Elkhart missed several scoring opportunities in the half due to being rushed too much and they failed to capitalize on three free tosses, but Gleason made two good just as the period ended. 13-2, Pulaski.

## Elkhart Goes To Work

Pulaski started out fast in this period with Buckles sinking a one hander and Bertoni getting a free toss which he made good. Veech added a sleeper, and then Anderson scored for Elkhart, their first basket. Buckles sank a one-hander from way out. McCue scored close in and M. Gleason potted in a one-hander. Buckles got a free one and made it good. With the score 21-8 and the regulars bogging down, the reserves went in. They were: Hatfield, Hahn, Maus and Henry Buckles. Greer fouled, made one good and Anderson plunked in a two-pointer. McCue sank a free one and Maus scored for the locals on a free one to end the first half.

## Third Quarter

West went on a rampage again scoring a rebound on Ayers shot and then getting ball, went down the floor ahead of the defense and scored. Veech then sank a short one on a fast pass from West. Elkhart came back with a bang, however, and McCue sank one from the side and Greer drove down the center for a basket. Bertoni fired an accurate floor-length pass to Buckles, who scored easily. McCue came in under and scored. Greer sank a one-handed push-shot that was good. Buckles scored on a free one and Veech came up with a short one to end the third period 33-20 in Pulaski's favor.

## Final Period

There was a lot of action in the final period, but not much scoring. Buckles missed a free toss but Bertoni rebounded to score. Buckles picked up three more points as he made a basket and was fouled on the shot, making his toss good. Buckles sank another free toss as Greer left the game with four personals. Elkhart shot from the middle of the floor and scored. Anderson missed one of two free tosses. M. Gleason also failed to make a free toss good. Veech finished the scoring on a fast break play that clicked nicely. Final score 41-24.

## FINDS OLD MEDAL

On the farm of Chris Erlenbush, over four miles southwest of Mount Pulaski, in the Steenberg cemetery vicinity, his son Chris picked up an old medal recently on the plowed ground, it being the size of a half dollar. How long it had been there nobody will ever know. After the medal was cleaned it showed the date of 1868, the picture of General U. S. Grant and his name on one side, while on the other side were the words, "I propose to fight it out on this line if it takes all summer." The medal is in a good state of preservation, and is made of brass. It was evidently used in General Grant's campaign for president following the Civil war.


