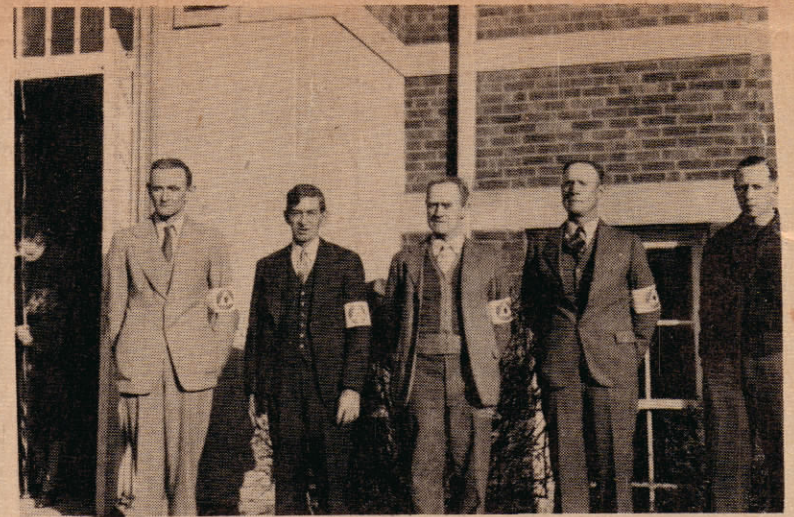
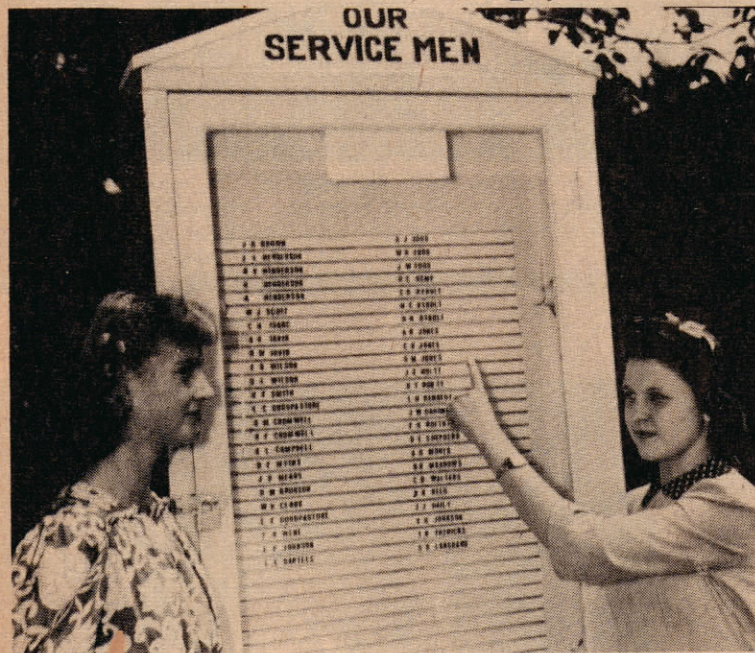

Kenney, Ill.--First 100% Town of the U. S. A.



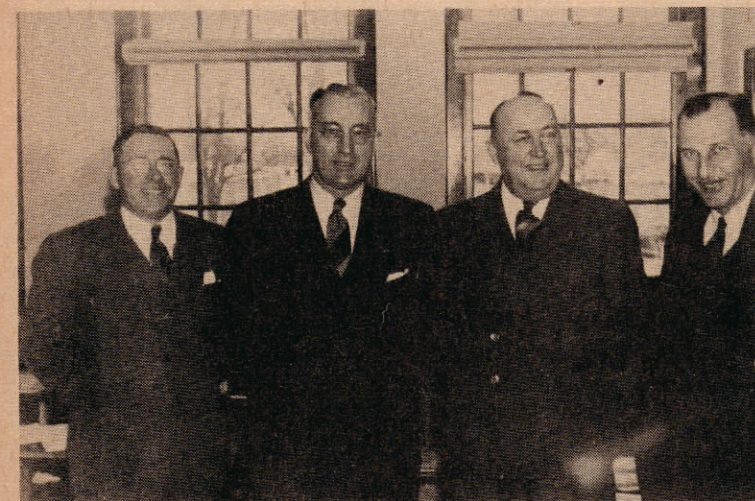

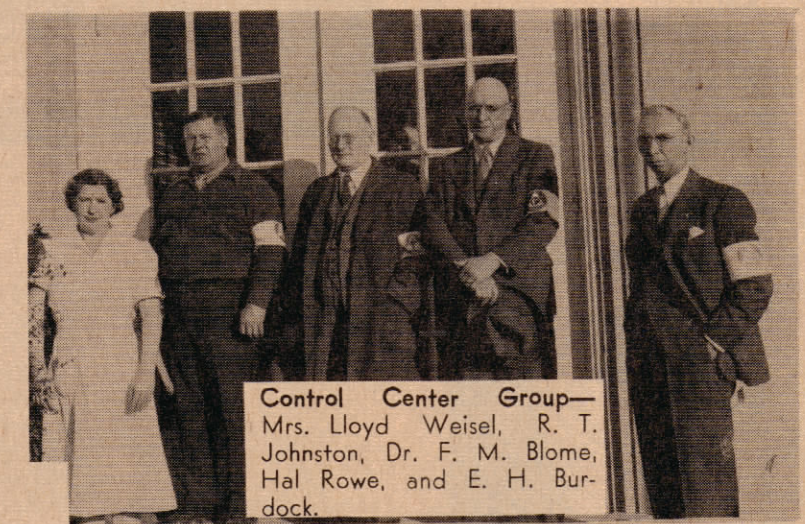


THE ENTIRE civilian corp is shown with defense coordinator E. H. Burdock. Mrs. Weisel is the only woman member. →

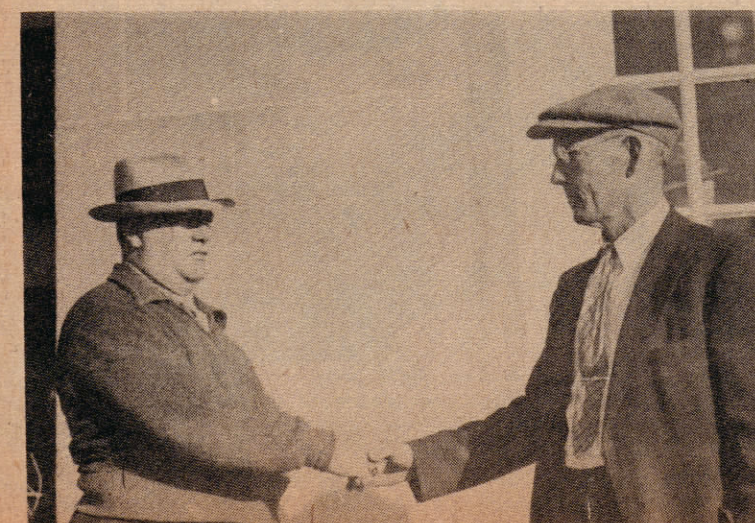
