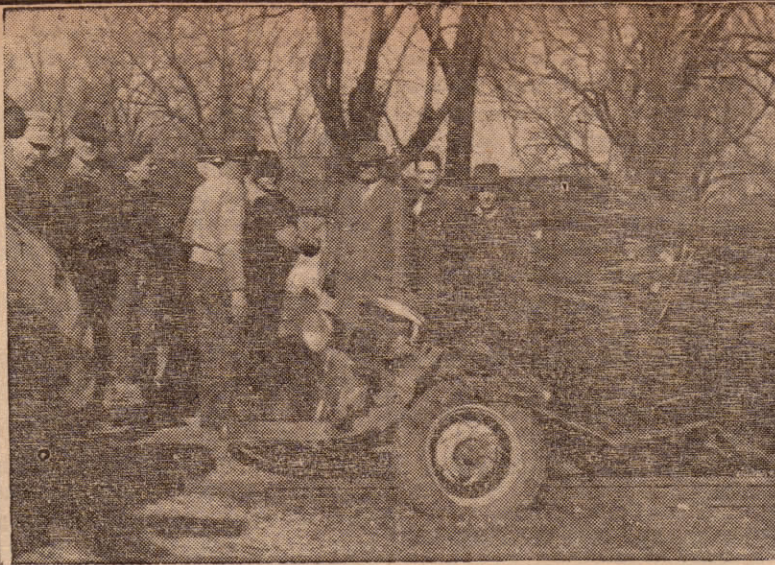
Harry S. Martin went to Chicago Wednesday to remain until Friday attending a Triple A meeting. He was accompanied by his wife.

Nation Pays Fine Tribute To Village of Kenney

First 100 Percent War Effort Town In the U. S. A.

Kenney, first village in the entire United States to reach 100 per cent in V-homes, celebrated that unique distinction with the same all-out cooperation Friday that won them their coveted national honor.

From Mayor Carl E. Fort's barber shop-office, where he stayed right on duty to give a dozen or more customers shaves, haircuts and shampoos in readiness for the big celebration Friday afternoon, all the way up the main street to the community high school, there was evidence of that united effort in the town's preparation for the event.

Flags flew in front of every business establishment. Men with hammers and stepladders were busy putting up last minute posters, and women hurried from home to store to church to school, gathering up chairs, seeing to last details of the program arrangements and giving whatever help they could in every likely place.

It was that same concerted effort that accounted for the sale of more than \$100,000 worth of War bonds and stamps; that brought in more than a fifth or a ton of scrap per capita; and that got every family complying fully with all OCD salvage, bond purchase and defense cooperation goals.

With Mayor Carl E. Fort's proclamation making it a holiday for schools, shops and stores, the town's entire population crowded into the gym at the high school long before the opening hour of 2 p.m. to take part in the two hour program featuring speeches

by state OCD officials and Lieut. Gov. Hugh Cross.

Music by the Kenney high school band opened the program, followed by Mayor Fort's address of welcome. The combined choral groups from Kenney churches sang "God Bless America," under the leadership of the Rev. J. L. Tyner.

Interviews with a number of Kenney residents by Eddie Dunn of radio station WBBM, Chicago, featured a 15-minute interval from 2:30 to 2:45. Mrs. Tracey Issac, mother of Kenney's first enlisted man, Chesley Isaac; Oscar Cromwell, local historian; Corp. Donald Kemp, service man home on furlough; E. H. Burdock, Kenney defense coordinator; Mayor Fort, and Mary Margaret Morse, a high school student ac-

tive in the scrap salvage, were those appearing on this portion of the program. It was recorded in the Chicago studio as a transcription and broadcast at 9:15 a. m. Saturday over a state wide hookup.

Homer Bradney of Jacksonville, vice chairman of the Civil Protection Division, Illinois State Council of Defense, was introduced by Mayor Fort, and he in turn presented Lieut. Gov. Cross for the principal address.

Lt.-Col. Severin Swenson of the Civilian Protection Division and John N. W. Sloan, regional director, division of public advice and counsel, spoke briefly.

Vocal solos by Miss Edna Hildreth, and a number of selections by the choral group, interspersed with brief talks by county and state defense officials, concluded the program.

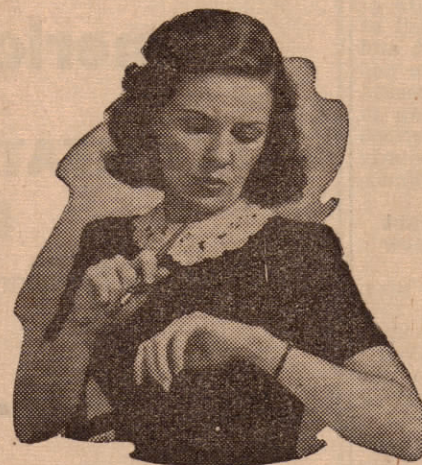
