State project, achievement awards have been given a number of 4-H club members of Logan county on the basis of work accomplished during the last year, it was revealed Saturday.

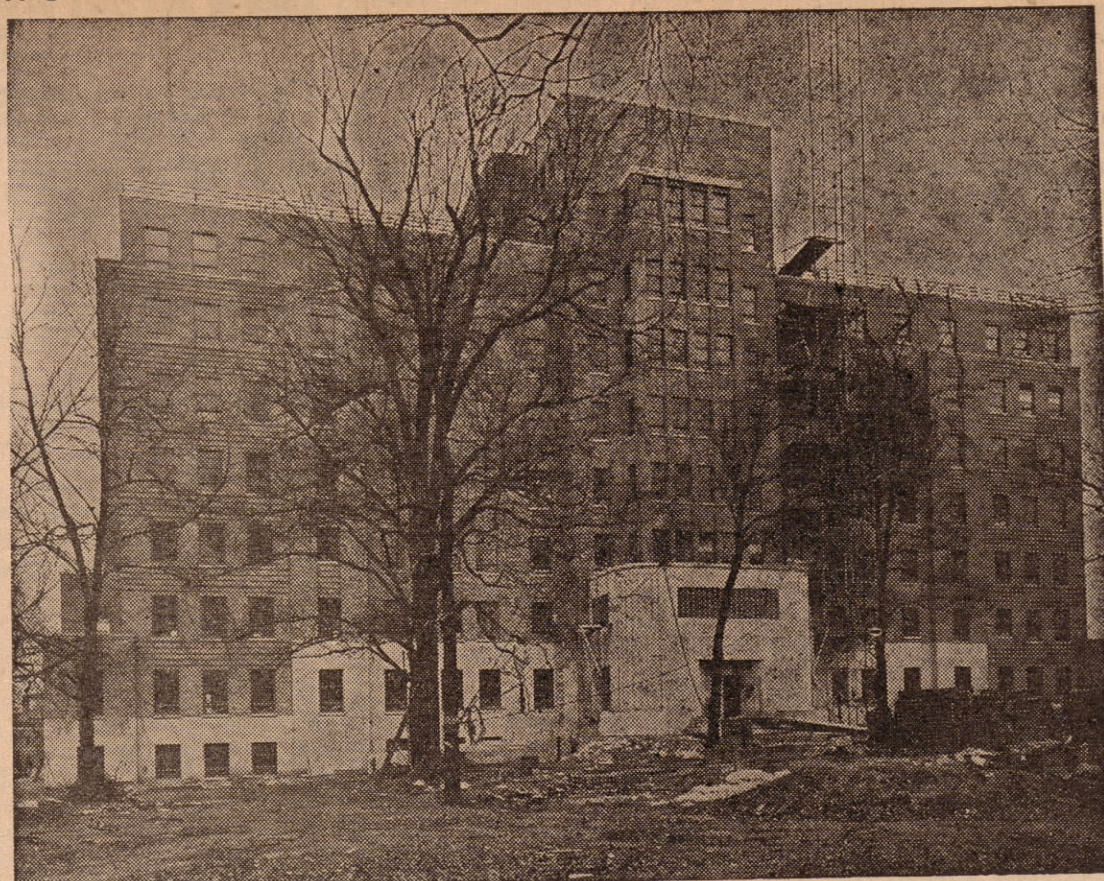
