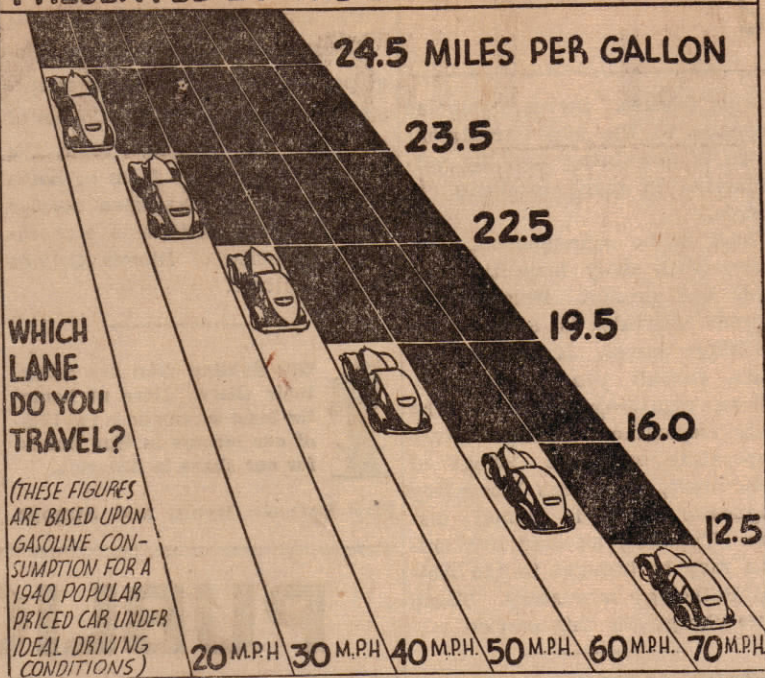

Would Give Relief Back to Supervisors

Proposed legislation for the return of all relief, including blind pensions, old age assistance and aid to dependent children to the office of the township supervisor will probably be placed before the Illinois legislature at the forthcoming session.

This proposal and the suggestion that township supervisors be made state agents for the handling of federal A. D. C. and old age assistance funds, were endorsed by members of the Illinois Association of Township Officials at their recent annual convention in Peoria.

The township officials adopted a comprehensive legislative program. The county and township officials will keep in close touch with the progress of important legislation at the legislative session through their monthly publication, The Illinois County and Township Official. Richard L. Morris, manager of the publication, has arranged many outlets for information which will make available up to the minute information for the township and the county officials.

County and township officials are vitally interested in several important legislative proposals to be presented to the legislators at their January session.

Christmas Seals Are Received

On Monday, Nov. 23, more than 100 million Christmas Seals were placed in the mails and have been received by residents of Illinois from their county tuberculosis associations. Take another look at the seals this year. They have a martial meaning now. Little though they are, they have a place among ships, planes, tanks and jeeps.

In all past wars tuberculosis has increased. Already it is increasing in a number of overcrowded areas throughout the country. Unless history can be rewritten this time, tuberculosis will kill more Americans throughout the duration than will be killed in action or die from wounds received in action.

The combined efforts of the Tuberculosis Associations, public health officials and the medical profession cannot control tuberculosis. The people must take an active part. We must buy Christmas Seals, the sole support of the Tuberculosis Associations, as never before. But buying Seals is not enough.

"The value of Farm Organization is no longer an issue. If farm organizations were to disappear tomorrow, it is certain that within a very short time their praises would be sung by even those who have never supported them. Let us also accept as fundamental at the outset that Farmers can only be served by organizations which are made up of farm people, led by farm leaders, financed entirely by farmers and run in the interest of the men and women on the farm who appreciate that the farmer's interests are best served only when society as a whole is best served. Acting as individuals, farmers have comparatively little influence. Acting together in the best interests of the nation, they are a powerful force."—Chris L. 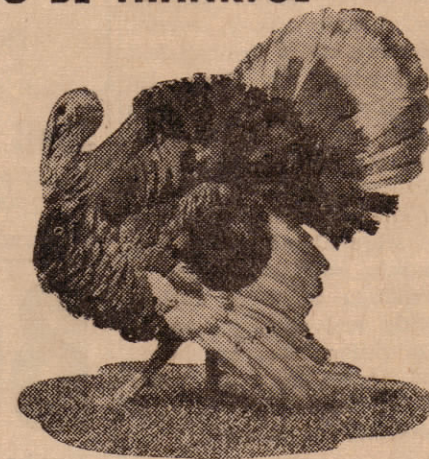
