Four Vagrants Accept Work

The following press service
was sent out of Springfield Mon-
day, with reference to Mount Pu-
laski:

"Four men, sentenced to serve
six months in jail on vagrancy
charges, were free Monday, ac-
cepting employment on a large
Logan county farm as their con-
tribution to the war effort. The
men had been given the choice of
going to jail or working on a
farm.

Police Judge William D. Con-
way, who announced recently
that he would suspend sentences
against transients convicted on
charges of vagrancy if they
would accept employment on
farms, said the four men were
hired by Elmer E. Allspach, who
operates an 800-acre farm eight
miles southwest of Mount Pulas-
ki.

Allspach, Conway said, offered
the men \$4 a day and their keep.
He said the services of one of
the four was declined because
he was a cripple, but that later
was accepted after he had beg-
ged to be taken, saying he
would work for half pay.

Allspach, Conway said, is the
first farmer to take advantage of
his offer to release prisoners to
help relieve a farm labor short-
age. He said he had received an
application from one man who
had not been arrested and who
had volunteered to work on a
farm.

EUGENE DOWNING WAS INDUCTED INTO ARMY

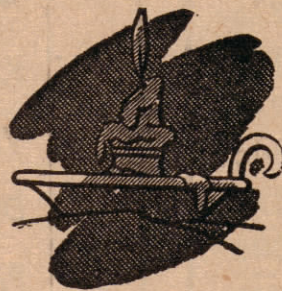
Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Downing

RECOVER GLASSES LOST 3 MONTHS

During the early part of July
Frank Sams, who lives four
miles east of Mount Pulaski, lost
a pair of gold rimmed glasses in

ober, and then shipped to the
Baldwin Grain Co., in Decatur.
A letter from the company to

the Mount Pulaski Grain Co. of-
fice in this city advised him that
a pair of glasses had been found
in the car of oats, and asked
him to check on it.

Joseph Fuhrer, manager of the
elevator at Narita, was notified,
and it was found that Mr. Sams
was the one who lost the glasses.
They went through the combine,
were taken to the elevator and
put in a bin, and three months
later got into the box car when
the oats were blown into it. The
strange part of it all is that the
glasses were not damaged in the
least after all of its travels.

Changes to Meet Wartime Needs

To meet wartime needs, both for the present and the still greater needs to come, Illinois
Central announces major changes in passenger schedules and service effective Sunday,
October 18th.

Departure and arrival times of popular trains have been revised. Schedules of many
