GASOLINE HOARDERS GIVEN WARNING

The dangers and penalties faced by anyone who attempts to hoard gasoline in anticipation of rationing are pointed out by the State Fire Marshal, John H. Craig. The Illinois gasoline code limits the amount of gasoline which may be kept on hand for private use, except in fuel tanks

of autos, to five gallons. Storage is not permitted in any basement, cellar or pit.

Storage exceeding five gallons must be in approved underground tanks, with approved pumps, such as are used by filling stations. An exception is made on farms, where three drums may be stored fifty feet from any building.

Mr. Craig warns that Federal rationing rules will contain provisions to catch hoarders, and that the Illinois gasoline laws will be strictly enforced.
