was aged 19 years and 24 days.

Louis attended the grade school and then the Township High school, graduating in the class of 1942. He was popular with his schoolmates and possessed many friends, and was a member of the basketball squad. Completing his school studies, he had been working for a number of weeks on the rebuilding of the Mount Pulaski-Elkhart highway, which is being resurfaced. While other workmen on the job put in extra time Friday, Louis went to Lincoln in the evening, and late that night took a friend home in Clinton. He was coming back to Mount Pulaski when the accident occurred.

Thomas Aquinas Catholic church and for a number of years served Louis was a member of the St. as altar boy.

The body was removed to the Schahl funeral home, remaining there until the hour of the funeral. About 500 persons called at the funeral home, among them being many Township High school students. The Rosary was said at the funeral home at 8 p. m. Monday.

He is survived by his father, one brother, William, Jr., who is in the Army and stationed at Camp Lee, Va.; two sisters, Barbara, wife of Wm. Schellert, Jr., of St. Louis, Mo., and Miss Rosemary Schwoerer, at home. His mother died suddenly from a heart attack on March 31.

Funeral services were held in St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic church at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, Requiem High Mass being said by the pastor, Rev. J. W. McGinn, of Elkhart, who was assisted by the choir. The services were largely attended, many of his graduating class being present in a body. There were many beautiful floral tributes.
