Ill. Central Employees Suggestion Meeting

The second weekly meeting of the "Employees War Production Drive Suggestion System" was held Monday morning in Supt. Hevrans office at Clinton, Ill. The committee is composed of four men from the management, J. W. Hevrans, Sup.; F. P. Nash, Master Mechanic; E. H. Hallman, Trainmaster; S. C. Jump, Divn. Engineer, and four employees: J. A. Hazelton, Conductor; Kenneth Duncan, Boilermaker; F. A. Robinson, Signal maintainer; and C. Homer Lane, Telegrapher.

The Illinois Central pioneered the Employees suggestion system, having put it into effect nearly four years ago, but in August at the request of the Government it was changed to its present name. The idea behind the plan is to put into use any of the suggestions presented by any of its nearly 40,000 employees that prove useful in more efficiency, safety, prevent waste and salvage of anything that will help win the war.

This system has now been put into use by several war production plants in the east and would prove beneficial to small organizations as well as large. The plan is this: each employee thinking of an idea, submits it in writing, and these are passed on by the committee, and the ones proving useful are adopted and the employee submitting it is given a cash award, depending on the merit of his or her suggestion. One employee received \$2605 for a suggestion some time ago that saved the company a great amount of money the past year.


