Looking over a History of Logan county, published in 1878, the following information is given that will be of much interest to many readers:

The Old Settlers' Association

"For several years the old settlers of Logan county have considered at various gatherings the desirableness of forming a permanent association, which should hold annual meetings, where old times could be remembered, and where a pleasant reminder of those "good old days" would be heard. One or two meetings were held but not until 1873 was the organization perfected. That year, on October 1, a meeting of several old settlers interested in the subject, was held in Mount Pulaski. It was called to order by David W. Clark, president of the temporary organization. Prayer was offered by Rev. John England, after which an address was delivered by Colonel Wm. M. Allen. He was followed by ex-Judge R. B. Ewing, and he by J. W. Randolph. Those speeches were all concerning the pioneer days of the county, and told vividly of the trials these and thers endured in the early setlement of the county. After iese and other remarks, a imptuous repast was served. On ssembling after dinner, John Buckles moved for the permament organization of the society, which carried, and the enrollment of members began. This being completed, the time for the next annual meeting was fixed, and
