## New Major At Oak Ordnance

Major Wm. J. Green has been assigned to the Oak Ordnance plant, Illiopolis, Ill., as area engineer, it was announced by plant officials. Major Green replaced Major Glen E. Hofto, who has been transferred to a teaching position at Manhattan State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Major Hofto, with a long record of experience in coast artillery, will be assistant professor of military science and tactics. He has been on the Oak plant assignment since the start of the project, early in the spring. The successful manner in which he supervised construction work at the plant has been commended on numerous occasions, by the St. Louis office of Dist. Engineers.

A dinner, attended by sixty members of the Oak plant staff closely associated with the army engineer, was held in the plant cafeteria. Representatives of the Ordnance department, Midland Foundation, Inc., Chas. W. Cole and Son, and Bates and Rogers Co., congratulated the major on his new assignment.

Major Green, introduced by Major Hofto, was welcomed by all the groups connected with the project. The new Area Engineer comes from the Eau Claire Ordnance Plant, Eau Claire, Wis.

### NEW RESTRICTIONS ON FARM BUILDING

Farm construction is affected by a recent revision of the War Production Board Order L-41. This order places all civilian building under rigid control. According to Leigh Lucas, Logan county Agricultural chairman, farmers will find it harder to get approval for the installation of heating plants, automatic water systems, plumbing units and electric wiring. Stricter standards have been set up for the County Agricultural War Boards to judge farmers' applications for essential construction exceeding the limits of the construction order. The limits are \$1,000 on the amount of new agricultural construction. No special permission the period of a year and \$200 on new farm residential construction. No special permission is needed for repair jobs, provided, however, there is no change in the design of the structure being repaired. Farmers may get detailed information on the construction conservation order at the Triple-A office.

### U. S. TO CONDEMN 132 ACRES FOR ROADS

The Federal government filed suit in U. S. district court on Thursday, Oct. 1, to condemn 7 tracts of land in Sangamon co., comprising 32.83 acres, and 7 tracts in Logan county, containing 99.40 acres, for use in connection with construction of access roads to the Sangamon and Oak ordnance plants.
