Court Upholds Award To Mrs. Thompson

An industrial compensation award of \$3,931.20, granted Mrs. Viola Thompson (Davis) of Middletown, by the late John Pico of Springfield, which had been denied by the state industrial commission, was upheld by Judge Frank Lindley in the circuit court Wednesday.

The award was for the death of Mrs. Thompson's husband, Louis Thompson, who was killed by a Chicago and Alton railroad train near Middletown, Sept. 11, 1929. Thompson and his son Ernest, who were employees of C. W. Barham, who held a sub contract to clear right of way for the Fred M. Crane company, in constructing the Lower Salt Creek drainage ditch, were hauling tools for the workmen when the accident occurred. Judge Lindley held the death occurred during a regular act of employment.

The industrial board reversed the decision of the arbitrator and Mrs. Thompson filed an appeal in the circuit court against the contractors and the Union Indemnity company.

The arbitrator had allowed the widow \$14 for 280 weeks for the death of her husband and \$9.45 a week for 51 weeks and \$4.72 a week for 52 weeks was allowed Ernest Thompson who was seriously injured. Judge Lindley's decision also includes an award to Ernest Thompson.—Middletown Ledger.

TEACHERS EXAMINATION

Teachers' examinations will be held on Thursday and Friday, July 21 and 22, 1932 and on Friday and Saturday, November 18 and 19, 1932.

Teachers may write for all grades of certificates at each of these examinations. The lowest grades of certificates are the limited state elementary certificate, the limited state special certificate and the limited state kindergarten-primary certificate. The pre-requisite for admission to the examination for any of these grades of certificates is 30 semester hours normal school or college credit. Each of these certificates is issued without examination on 60 semester hours normal school or college credit. These certificates are valid for four years. When earned by credits they are renewable indefinitely. When earned by examination the first time upon a total of 60 semester hours of normal school or college credit, thereafter they are renewable indefinitely. In other words, an applicant for a certificate had one year of training beyond high school but he must obtain an additional year of training within four years for the first renewal.

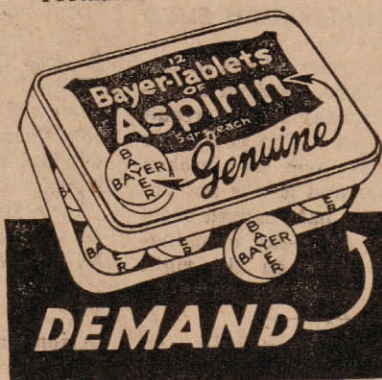

SCORES HURT IN ORANGE-GREEN ROW

Scores of Irish men and women nursed more or less serious injuries today after a flaring of the ancient feud between the Orange and the Green Monday.

JOHN HUNTER KILLED BY PLANE PROPELLOR

John Hunter, one of the four brothers who set a world's airplane endurance record at Chicago two years ago, was killed Monday when the propeller of his ship struck his head.

MERCHANT CANCELS DEBTS ON BOOKS

HAUSNER TO MAKE SECOND OCEAN FLIGHT

Safely back on dry land again after eight days in a wave-tossed plane followed being forced down on an attempted flight from New York to Poland, Stanislaus Hausner is resting and making plans for another transatlantic hop.

EIGHT SHOT IN W. VA. MINE CRASH

One man was killed and seven others were wounded, two dangerously, in a coal mine strike shooting at Maysville mine of the Kelley's Creek Colliery company last week.

WATCH PLANS FOR AVOIDING POSTAGE

The increase in postage rates from 2 to 3 cents effective July 6, has caused public utility companies and other organizations using the mails to distribute their monthly bills to consider other means. In some cities use of men now unemployed has been suggested.

The increased postage and tax on bank checks, with which many bills are paid, are said by business men to involve a contribution of 11 cents on each bill paid by mail with a check. At that rate every 100,000 bills would mean a contribution of \$11,000 to the government. Hiring private carriers at modest wages would save money for both the companies and their customers, they say.

The post office department, however, points out the postal laws do not permit anyone to enter into competition with the postal service in carrying letters. There is no objection to a company using its own employees for deliveries, but two or more companies will not be allowed to use the same employee, nor hire a messenger or other delivery service to deliver their bills.

HARD ROAD WORK NEAR HARTSBURG

Rapid Progress Being Made On Slab and Bridge Work Near There

It won't be long until the pavements will be finished through Hartsburg. One and three tenths miles of pavement were completed during the past week. A total of four miles of pavement is now completed on Route 121. There is still one and three-fourths miles to be completed to fill the gap from south of Hartsburg to where the mixers are working north of town.

The strip of pavement from the McMath crossing to Hutton's Lodge is open for traffic. A crew is working on the shoulders of the stretch of road.

Grading is now completed from the McCormick corner to Indian Creek. The north abutment of the bridge across Indian is Snake Hollow is almost completed and the excavation for the south abutment is finished. Slab has been poured on the two approach spans on the north end of Sugar Creek Bridge.

The first coat of white paint has been applied on the steel of that bridge. The bridge can now be seen from Hartsburg.

No especial word has been received about the work on the Emden spur. We understand though that the right-of-way has been obtained with the exception of the Scully estate which only awaits Mr. Scully's approval. Work will probably start on the Emden spur at an early date.—Hartsburg Journal.
