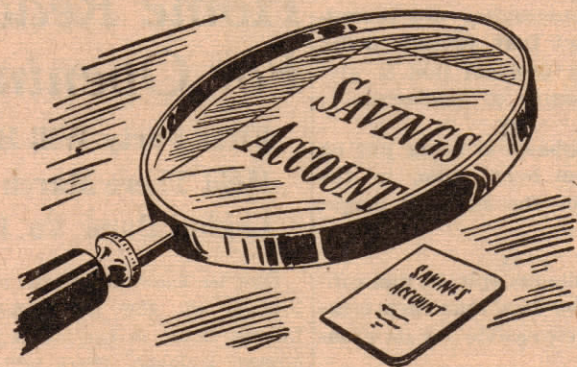
In the Democratic caucus held Wednesday, Feb. 26, in Lake Fork township, in the southeast corner of Logan County, Albert Reiterman was nominated candidate for supervisor, and George Grathwohl candidate for highway commissioner. Both men are incumbents. Mr. Reiterman is a member of the public buildings, misc.; state aid to townships; bovine T. B. eradication committees; and also serves on a special committee, flood control, of the Logan county board of supervisors.

Caucuses were held recently in Elkhart and Hurlbut townships by both the Republican and the Democratic parties, and nominees

selected for town offices. In Elkhart township Clarence Kerschner, Democrat, an incumbent, and Raymond Lanterman, Republican, are candidates for highway commissioner.
