## Volle Cabin on Salt Creek Burned Down Sunday Evening

### Was Popular As A Camping Spot For The Past 30 Years.

The two-story frame cabin on the banks of Salt creek, three miles north of Mount Pulaski, long known as the Volle cabin, owned by George A. Volle and J. M. Rothwell, was destroyed by fire between 8 and 9 o'clock Sunday night, April 13. The loss is estimated at \$1,500.

The cabin was built about 30 years ago and had long been a favorite camping and picnic spot being used not only by the families of the owners, but by organizations at various times.

The new Mount Pulaski fire truck was called but the blaze had gained such headway that firemen found it impossible to save the old building. The trees nearby were saved. Fire Chief Oscar W. Mayer said that current from power lines running to the cabin threatened hosemen with electrocution had they continued to pour water on the fire.

The glare in the sky could be seen as far away as Decatur and hundreds of people gathered in a short while.

## BEASON ANNEX FAILED TO CARRY

The proposition to annex all of the non-high territory in Aetna to the Beason high school district was defeated overwhelmingly on Saturday as the voters in the territory rolled up a vote of 109 against and 55 for.

The defeat of the proposition now leaves the matter of apportioning the district up to the school survey committee who will interview residents of the territory and after finding their preference as to which high school district they wish to join, will then make the recommendation and arrange for the calling of an election in the different sections.

This will insure a fair division of the territory, with part of it going to Beason and the rest to Mount Pulaski. Just where the dividing line will be is up to the school survey committee to say.

## Fred J. Stoll, Chestnut Passed On Saturday

Fred J. Stoll, a resident of the Chestnut vicinity most of his life, but who had lived on a farm between Lincoln and Lawn-dale for three years, died at 11:30 a. m. Saturday, April 12, 1947, in the Illinois State hospital, Jacksonville, where he was a patient only one week. Mr. Stoll had purchased a home in Beason, and after holding a public sale, was preparing to move when he became suddenly ill. He was aged 70 years, 4 months, 5 days.

Mr. Stoll was born Dec. 7, 1876, near Chestnut, a son of Earhardt and Mary Mayer Stoll. His father was a native of Germany, and his mother was born in Mount Pulaski. He grew to young manhood in his home community, and always followed the occupation of farming. In Granville, Iowa, on December 8, 1911, he married Miss Ida Walker, and they began housekeeping on a farm near Chestnut, where

Polls will be open from 12 noon to 7 p. m.
