REFLECTIONS Matthew H. Scott, Prominent Farmer, The runaway season is at Died On Tuesday

Had Been Failing In Health Many Months. Services Tomorrow.

Matthew Henry Scott, a well known farmer living in the Copeland Christian church community, over seven miles southwest of Mount Pulaski, died in his home at 12:45 p. m., on Tuesday, April 22, aged 64 years, 4 months few "blue moments" until they and 14 days. He had been failing in health many months.

He was born Dec. 8, 1882, near Buffalo Hart, Ill., a son of John and Mary Williams Scott, and grew to young manhood in his home locality. In Springfield, Ill., Jan. 21, 1914, he married Miss Alma Weddle, also of Buffalo Hart, and they began housekeeping on the farm where the family has lived during his wedded life. He was highly respected by his neighbors and had many good friends. Mr. Scott was a member of Copeland Christian church.

Besides his wife, he is survived by the following children: Dean Scott and Nancy Lou Scott, Mount Pulaski; Mrs. Georgia Mc-Glauchlen, Loami; Mrs. Fern Clements, Edinburg; and Duane Scott, U. S. Navy, stationed at Newport, Maine; two sisters, Mrs. Laura Nation, Buffalo, and Mrs. Frank Dill, Springfield; and four brothers, William Scott, of Cornland; John Scott, Springfield; Edward Scott, Mount Pulaski, and Blane Scott, Buffalo.

The remains were removed to the Schahl funeral home, Mount Pulaski, and later returned to the family home.

Funeral services will be held in the Copeland Christian church at 2 p. m. Friday, April 25, conducted by Rev. Carroll Langston. Burial will be made in Mechanicsburg cemetery.
