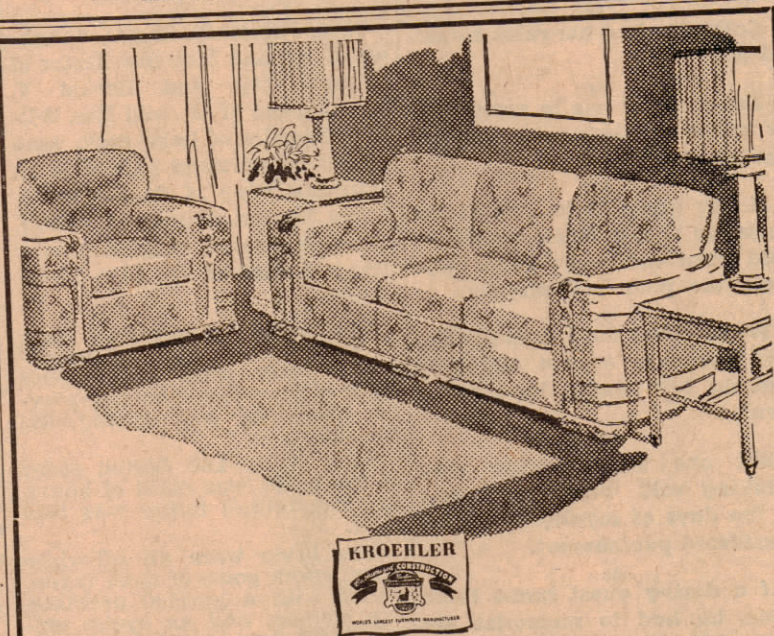

SMALLEST WOMAN IN ILLINOIS IS DEAD

Miss Lottie May Guyett, 63 North 9th street, Springfield, died at her home at 8 a.m. Monday, June 30, 1947, after an illness of two years.

Miss Guyett, reportedly the smallest woman in Illinois, was 37 inches tall and weighed 65 lbs. and formerly traveled with several circuses and carnivals. She was born August 3, 1883 in Elkhart, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Guyett, but had spent most of her life in Springfield.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Gertrude Barringer and Mrs. Mary Sprouge, and a brother, John Guyett, of Springfield. An uncle, George Criland of Cornland and 20 nieces and nephews. Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the Vancil funeral home and burial was in the Oak Ridge cemetery, Springfield.
