## PULASKI FANS LICK LINCOLN FOR THIRD TIME THIS SEASON

Mount Pulaski Fans made it three straight wins over Lincoln for the season, when they knocked off their old rivals, 7 to 3 in a "hot" ball game at Dittus field Sunday afternoon.

Dittus, on the mound for the locals, did a neat job of hurling and was in no serious difficulty except in the third when an error, bad throw on a double-play ball, paved the way for two runs when Henson smashed out a three-bagger to clean the sacks. A wild pitch by Dittus allowed another run this inning and that was all for Lincoln.

Pulaski started scoring in the first inning when Kinert hit to center, Manes bunted safely. Kinert was forced at third on Ingram's grounder and Wilham hit to short for the second out. Horn was safe on an error and the bases were loaded when Shanle came to bat. He promptly hit safely, scoring Manes.

In the second Pulaski got two when Gaffney walker, and second baseman misjudged Wilham's high fly, Gaffney going to third on the play. Ingram hit over second to score both runners. In the third Pulaski again worked on Taylor. Horn was out, but Shanle walked, then died stealing. Blackwell walked and stole second. Dittus walked and Gaffney smashed out a two-bagger to score Dittus and Blackwell, but he was out when he overran second.

Lincoln threatened in the fifth when they had men on second and third on a walk and a hit. Henson was intentionally passed to load the bases, and the strategy worked for the next batter hit to the pitcher and the runner was caught at home and Shanle pegged to first for a double play.

Pulaski scored their sixth run in the seventh when Dittus hit over third and went clear around to third base on a bad throwin, then scoring on Gaffney's long fly to center. They scored their last run when Ingram walked and Wilham hit over second, scoring on Blackwell's slow roller to the pitcher.

Lincoln had a rally started in the ninth but when first and third were occupied with one out the runner tried to steal and Shanle caught him, then Manes at second whipped the ball to third in time to catch the runner off base, and retire the side.

Mason City, one of the stronger clubs in the league, will be here next Sunday afternoon for a return game.

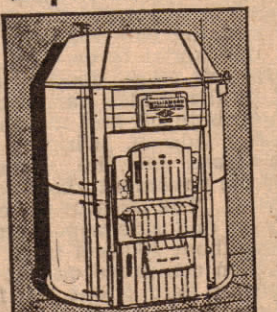

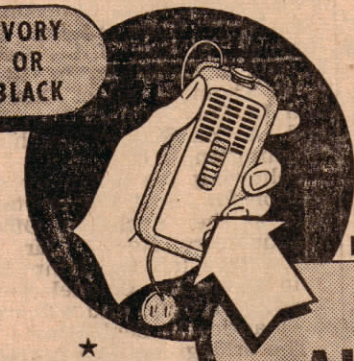
