**FAST TRACK AT  
MACON SPEEDWAY**

Macon—Barring further misfortune in form of mechanical breakdown, Red Hamilton, outstanding youthful Decatur mid-gel driver, will make his first Macon County Speedway appearance in the powerful Johnny Morrison blue and cream No. 45 Offy Saturday night when the track presents its 17th weekly speed program with at least 8 Offys among the more than 25 cars entered.

With the racing strip continuing to be lightning fast, officials are expecting another assault on time and have \$50 additional prize money for the driver who can lower Ray Knepper's single lap record of 12.84 seconds and sit on the pole for the start of the 25-lap feature event.

Time trials will start at 7:30 p.m. (CST) the first race at 8:30. The Belleville ace, Ray Knepper, who was back in the win column here after a two week absence, averaged 13.33 seconds for each of the 10 laps as he was clocked at 2 minutes, 13.34 seconds in the first preliminary, and had an average of 13.40 seconds for his feature triumph—5 minutes, 35.12 seconds.

It was Knepper's first victory in the Tomshe No. 12 Offy—Rex Easton's 'old' car—and gave the track three winners in as many weeks—Easton, Frank Burany and Knepper.

**Casey Jones' Fireman  
Remembers Last Words**

Jackson, Tenn., Aug. 22 (ANP) —Sim T. Webb, who fired No. 382 when Casey Jones pushed it to its last fateful ride 47 years ago, recalled the famed engineer's last words last week when a monument was unveiled on Jones' previously unmarked grave.

The famous Casey of song and story was extolled by the speech-makers while the small crowd stirred uneasily in the boiling sun in the quiet of nearby Calvary cemetery. Many nice things were said about Casey.

But Webb, who was with Jones just before the crash, stole the show as he recalled the engineer's last words:

"Oh, Sim! The old girl's got her high-heeled slippers on to-night. (Casey was trying to make up the 30 minutes they were running late out of Durant, Miss., trying to take the south-bound mail from Memphis to Canton, Miss.).

The ceremonies were presided over by Columnist Lucius Beebe and Railroad Photographer Charles Clegg, a couple of New Yorkers who sponsored the monument.

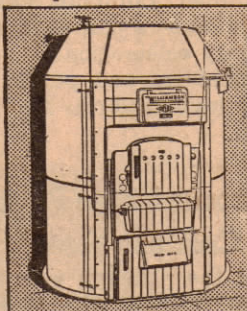

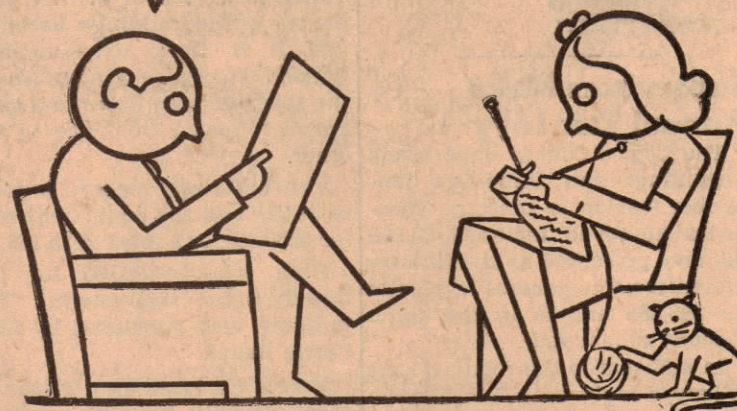
