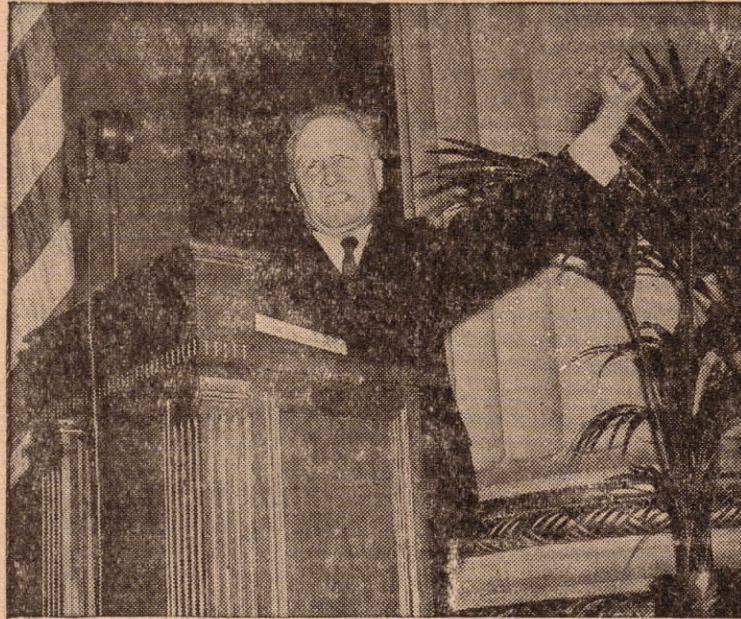

**THE FIFTEENTH LUTHERAN HOUR ...
 ON THE AIR**


Sunday, September 28, will mark the beginning of the Fifteenth Lutheran Hour season, as Bringing Christ to the Nations embarks upon another season of its soul-saving activity.

This date also marks the return to the air of Dr. Walter A. Maier, regular Lutheran Hour speaker. During May, June and part of July Dr. Maier served in the American zone of Germany as a technical adviser to the United States Military Government. Dr. Maier is currently on leave of absence from the professorship of Old Testament Interpretation and History at Concordia Theological Seminary, Saint Louis, Missouri.

The opening broadcast will originate from Chicago, Illinois, in connection with a gigantic mass meeting to be held there at the Chicago Stadium.

September 28 also marks the attainment of the thousand-station goal, as Bringing Christ to the Nations is heard over a mightier system than ever before.

The program is carried over approximately 300 network and 300 transcription stations in the United States.

The domestic programs are supplemented by approximately 400 outlets featuring the broadcast in English, Spanish, Portuguese, French, Arabic and Afrikaans in the following territories and foreign countries: Alaska, Argentina, Australia, Austria, Bolivia, Brazil, British Guiana, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Dutch Guiana, Ecuador, El Salvador, Fiji Islands, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Mexico, Mozambique, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Tangiers, Tasmania, Uruguay and Venezuela.

During the Fourteenth Lutheran Hour season (the last program of which was aired on September 21) approximately 400,000 people wrote their appreciation of Dr. Maier's challenging, Christ-centered messages.
