Sunday, September 28, will mark the beginning of the Fifteenth Lutheran Hour season, as Bringing Christ to the Nations embarks upon another season of its soul-saving activity.

This date also marks the return to the air of Dr. Walter A. Maier, regular Lutheran Hour speaker. During May, June and part of July Dr. Maier served in the American zone of Germany as a technical adviser to the United States Military Government. Dr. Maier is currently on leave of absence from the professorship of Old Testament Interpretation and History at Conterpretation and History at Con-cordia Theological Seminary, Saint Louis, Missouri.

The opening broadcast will originate from Chicago, Illinois, in connection with a gigantic mass meeting to be held there at the Chicago Stadium.

September 28 also marks the attainment of the thousand-station goal, as Bringing Christ to the Nations is heard over a mightier system than ever before. The program is carried over approximately 300 network and 300 transcription stations in the United States.
