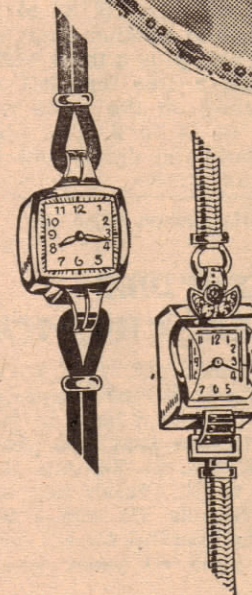
Mrs. A. F. Lipp returned home last Friday from the Deaconess hospital, Lincoln, after being a medical patient there about ten days.

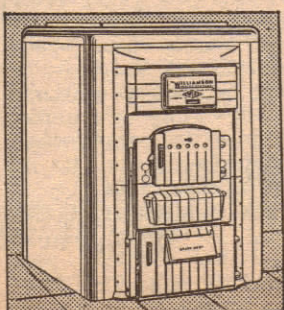
