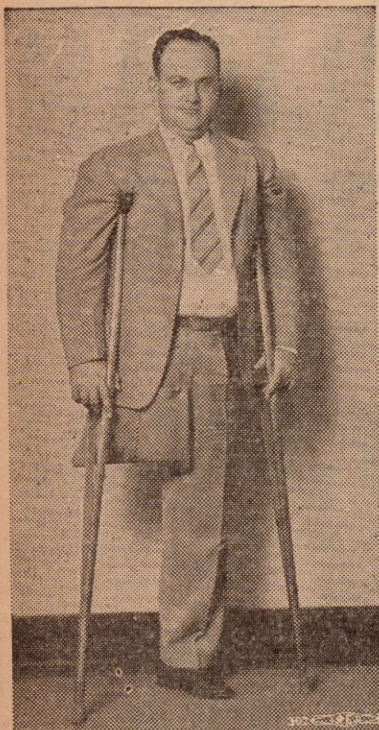

1. Co-operate in all programs sponsored by the government to alleviate suffering, promote victory, and establish an enduring peace.
